

EXPLOPING STROMNESS

Stromness is a great place to explore - there are lots of narrow roads, hidden lanes and piers.

REMEMBER it can be busy at times so be VERY CAREFUL especially on the streets and remember cars go both ways along the street.

TAKE CARE if you go near the edge of any piers - the stones can be slippery if they are wet.








You can explore Stromness'using any of the roads (marked in red) and the footpaths (marked in blue).


DID YOU KNOW?

DID YOU KNOW? Graham Place was named after him.

The street was paved 160 years ago. Before that there was a dirt road that became very muddy in the rain.

DID YOU KNOW?

The smaller stones in the middle of the street were for the horses so that their feet didn't slip. Some of the stones have been replaced with new ones.

Did you notice where the stones changed from new to old? Just' imagine when this place used to be busy with people washing clothes, fetching water and feeding chickens!

Now it's quiet.

DID YOU KNOW?

The houses were built with the gable end facing the sea because the weather was so rough.

How many houses can you see with crow steps? You can find the crow steps at the ends of the roof, below the chimneys.

Why do you think the houses were built so close together?

This house is built like an old Orkney stone house for children to play in.

DID YOU KNOW?

The house is called Cubby Roo and was built in July 2012.

How many crow steps are on Cubby Roo?
